From Ice to Flight: latest from the Great Fen Project

This is the latest phase of a project that seeks to restore 3,700 hectares of fen mostly within Huntingdonshire fen to its natural state. The particular focus of current work is to unravel the complex history of Whittlesea Mere that is central to so much. This includes excavations of an Ice Age site at one extreme to that of a wartime Spitfire crash at the other, both aiming to engage the local community and teach archaeological technique.

Jason Peters The Lost Forests of Medieval Huntingdonshire

Today's Huntingdonshire may have a few woods, but a *Forest*, that sounds hardly credible. And yet if we glance at Speed's map the evidence is staring us in the face; and was it not in the Huntingdonshire Forest of Weybridge that the unpopular John Tiptoft, Earl of Worcester was found hiding and began his journey to the scaffold? Jason has been looking at the evidence and will be showing us what differences this means for our understanding of the medieval landscape.
